

Statement on Intellectual Freedom

Intellectual freedom means that everyone has the right to their own opinion and to access information and ideas from all points of view without restriction.

The Colchester-East Hants Public Library (the Library) believes that intellectual freedom is an essential human right. We support the principles in the Canadian Federation of Library Associations' Statement on Intellectual Freedom. You can read more about that here: Statement on Intellectual Freedom and Libraries.

Censorship occurs when individuals or groups deny access to ideas and information they think is dangerous or offensive. Censorship also occurs when materials are restricted to particular audiences, based on their age or other characteristics.

The Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms

The Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms gives everyone in Canada the right to free thought, belief, opinion, and expression. You can read more about the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms here: Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms. These rights are subject only to the Constitution and reasonable limits set by law.

The Exception: Hate Speech

The Library supports intellectual freedom, **but** we do not support people sharing views that are hateful. Canadian courts decide what is considered hateful based on the *Criminal Code of Canada*. You can read the *Criminal Code of Canada* here:

How the Library Supports Intellectual Freedom

Supporting intellectual freedom is one of the Library's core responsibilities. We do this by:

- Supporting Library users' rights to explore different viewpoints through reading, writing, listening, and speaking.
- Recognizing peoples' right to disagree with other people or groups.
- Fighting against censorship and systems that restrict access.

We offer access to materials on different viewpoints, opinions, and ideas so that every community member may freely engage with materials of their choosing. Some library materials may be controversial or offensive to some people.
